Reverend Roosevelt Baums is a man of God who gets excited with opportunities to help penurious groups. Whether deprived physically, socially or spiritually, the more problems the identified group has, the more motivated Reverend Baums becomes to meet the challenge.

Reverend Baums' life is well-diversified with church, school and community-based involvement and services. Born in Miami, Florida, he was reared in Tuskegee, Alabama, "The Pride of the Swift Growing South and the Home of Tuskegee Institute (University)." As a very young child he started his project management training by borrowing a piece of his grandmother's garden, learning weather patterns, soil preparation, growing, marketing and selling of his own cucumbers to local markets and restaurants. During his early childhood he developed an interest in the performing arts, writing and poetry. He performed in many plays and dramatic poetry readings and participated in numerous oratory contests.

Graduating from William Henry Spencer High School of Columbus, Georgia, he continued his education and received his B.S. degree from Syracuse University. A life-long learner, he has attended many workshops and taken many additional college courses, most recently from Colgate in Rochester, New York.
