1. COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT: Marty Skahen, Director

a. Authorizing the Onondaga County Executive to File the 2025 Action Plan for the Community Development Block Grant, Home Grant, and Emergency Solutions Grant Programs (\$3,219,764)

PURPOSE:

Authorize and adopt the 2025 Action Plan which serves as the application to HUD for 3 entitlement grants: Community Development Block Grant, Home Grant, and Emergency Solutions Grant. The Action Plan has been reviewed and approved by the CD Steering Committee.

OBJECTIVE/WORK PLAN:

To obtain our "base funding" from HUD. The total application amount is \$3,219,764.

FUNDING SOURCE:

Federal funding from the U.S. Dept. of Housing & Urban Development.

Questions/Comments from the Committee:

- CD team works very hard and does a great job with projects
- Shout out to Mike LaFlair for keeping up with the municipalities
- Were all funds all allocated?
 - Yes, CD will submit to HUD once resolution is adopted at the 7/1/25 Session
 - o HUD typically approves Action Plans around Thanksgiving
 - o Goal is to get contracts in place through the winter and start projects in the spring
- Good to see increase in matches; able to get more meaningful work done
- Is the increased match a trend that Community Development (CD) is working towards or did it just happen to be this year?
 - o It just happened to be this year
 - Town of Dewitt has a large State grant
 - o Application requires a 25% match
- Not all towns qualify for the grant because it goes by census blocks and is income driven
 - o Most villages, except Fayetteville, are in census tracks
 - o Many towns did not have an opportunity to apply because they did not qualify
 - Favetteville does a lot of work on their senior center
 - Senior centers are considered low income due to fixed incomes
 - A senior center is considered an allowable expense for the CDBG grant even if it is not in the census track
 - o If a park puts in an inclusive playground, it will qualify whether it is in a census track or not

2025 Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) Spreadsheet – See Attachment No. 1

- Requests and awards are not in alignment with the ESG grant because the ask exceeds available funds
- Applications reveal other funding streams
- Knowing funding streams of each applicant allows the review committee to better allocate ESG grant money

A motion was made by Mr. Olson, seconded by Ms. Fiato, to approve this item.

• City of Syracuse is not included because the city gets its own pot of money which is much more than the County gets

A vote was taken on the item. *Passed unanimously; MOTION CARRIED*.

b. INFORMATIONAL: Shape-Up for Veterans

- CD has had a program called Shape-Up for years
- The Shape-Up program is for low income persons age 62 or older who need work done on their home
 - o Eligible work includes: roof, porch, mechanical work, wheelchair ramp etc.
 - o The program does not allow for cosmetic updates
- County Executive budgeted \$1M in 2022 to fund the Shape-Up for Veterans program
 - o Shape-Up for Veterans is the same as the Shape-Up program except there is no age restriction
- Additional \$77K was allocated to the veterans program in 2024
- All money has been allocated to projects
 - o Completed 49 jobs for \$931,204
 - 9 jobs are under contract in various stages

Questions/Comments from the Committee:

- How many applications usually come in?
 - o Once funding is allocated, a waitlist is started
 - Applications are not accepted for those who are waitlisted

- How many people are on the waitlist?
 - o Do not have that information today, will get the number for the committee
- There are parallel programs for regular Shape-Up and Shape-Up for Veterans?
 - o Yes
- The goal of the program is to keep people in their homes?
 - o That is the goal for the regular Shape-Up program
 - o The Shape-Up for Veterans program is to remove the age barrier so younger vets can apply as well
- The program is helpful for vets needing accessibility improvements
- Is there a lien?
 - o There is a lien for Shape-Up, but not for Shape-Up for Veterans
- Is there a popular item needed (ie: windows, roofing)?
 - o It has been a mix
- Is there a match?
 - o There is not a match; people are told there is a \$15K limit
 - Once a job is assessed and estimated, CD will sometimes end up blending money
 - Some jobs are \$23K, some are \$8K
- Can people apply for more money?
 - o They apply for the job, not the money
 - CD does an estimate to make sure it can be covered before putting it out to contractors
- What are some of the challenges as far as vets knowing about the program?
- Has there been feedback from the vets?
 - o Did a Shape-Up, veterans based program a number of years ago through HUD funding
 - o Had 2 issues:
 - It was almost impossible to actually spend the money because it was sponsored through HUD
 - Found a strong hesitancy where the veteran community did not want help
 - Ended up giving most of the money back because it was not used by the deadline
 - o Mike LaFlair did a lot of recruiting for the Shape-Up for Veterans program when it launched
 - Focus was to get in front of veterans groups to make sure they understood this was a thank you for the service they provided, not a handout
 - Visited towns to get the word out
 - o Had a stronger reception with the local program than with the HUD program
- Is there a certain area in the county where the program is more widely used?
 - o It is pretty spread out
 - Biggest selling point is word of mouth
- Given the waitlist, is there a suggested dollar amount needed to start again?
 - o Can provide the number of people currently on the waitlist with a max of \$15K per person
- Are any organizations CD works with helping to spread the word?
 - o Provide brochures to the VFW to pass out
 - Mike LaFlair sends a list with brochures to towns and villages to let them know who is claiming a veterans tax exemption in hopes the municipality will forward program information to the vet
