**AUTHORIZING AN INTERMUNICIPAL AGREEMENT BETWEEN ONONDAGA COUNTY AND
THE NATIONAL LIBRARY SERVICE FOR THE BLIND AND PRINT DISABLED**

WHEREAS, the County of Onondaga, by and through the Onondaga County Public Library (“OCPL”), seeks to expand services at its libraries for county residents who have permanent or temporary visual, physical, or reading disabilities that prevent them from using regular library print materials; and

WHEREAS, the National Library Service for the Blind and Print Disabled (“NLS”), upon application and approval, offers digital and physical equipment, materials, and products to institutions that serve individuals with visual, physical, or reading disabilities; and

WHEREAS, the OCPL has identified this NLS program as one that would expand reading and learning access in the community by allowing residents with visual, physical, or reading disabilities access to digital talking books, braille hard-copy books, media players, and other equipment; and

WHEREAS, the NLS lends its digital and physical equipment, materials, and products at no cost for as long as the recipient needs, after which the OCPL must return such federal property; and

WHEREAS, to be eligible to receive these NLS services, the OCPL must first obtain this legislative approval; now, therefore be it

RESOLVED, that the County Executive is hereby authorized to execute an inter-municipal agreement with NLS and such other documents as may be reasonably necessary to carry out the intent of this resolution.

**AUTHORIZING THE ACCEPTANCE OF PROPERTY USED FOR HIGHWAY PURPOSES FROM

WHEREAS, the State of New York has jurisdiction of 0.012 ± acres of surplus real property used for highway purposes, and formerly a County road, located along West Genesee Street, State Highway No. 8356, in the Village of Skaneateles, as depicted in New York State Department of Transportation Abandonment Map, Map No. 1, Parcel No. 1, prepared by Paul J. RESOLVED, that the County Executive is hereby authorized to accept the State Property upon abandonment thereof by the State of New York pursuant to Highway Law § 10(32) and, thereafter, transfer to 3-11 West Genesee Street LLC said State Property for \$1.00, waived, and to execute deeds, agreements, and such other documents as may be necessary to implement the intent of this resolution.

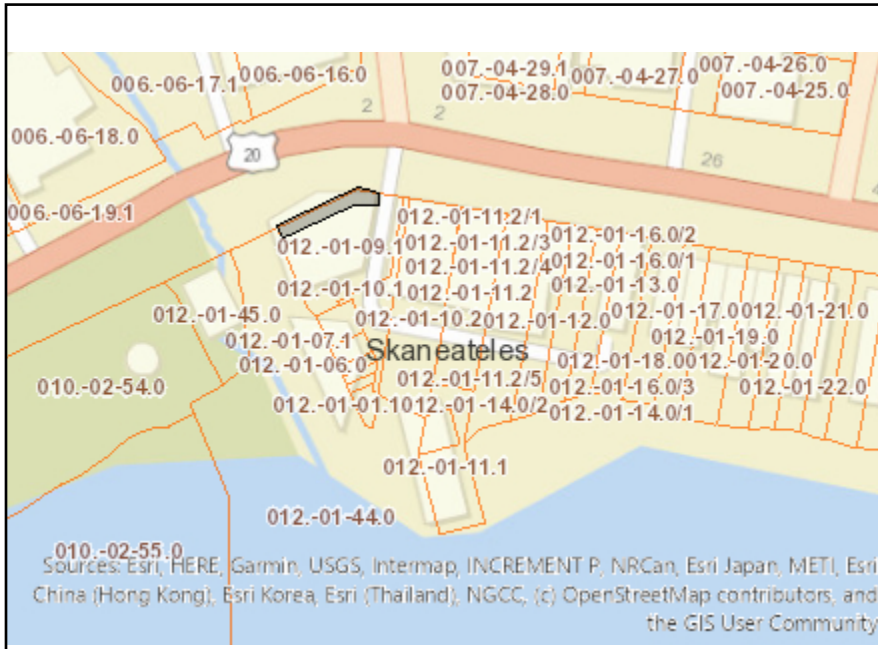

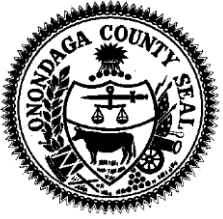

PURPOSE:

To approve the budget transfer of funds within Transportation's Road Machinery 2025 operating budget to allow for the replacement of a 1993 Ford F-700, utilizing an existing anticipated Equipment budget balance of \$104,632, along with the additional funds of \$30,000 as outlined under Budget below.

OBJECTIVE/ WORK PLAN:

This vehicle is essential for winter snow removal operations as it is needed to carry the plows from the plow trucks that have broken down mid-route back to the maintenance facilities when the plow truck has to be towed. This vehicle is also necessary during summer road maintenance activities, as it carries truck and tractor tires out to the work zones when there is a need to change out tires on the job sites. The current economic climate necessitates making this purchase asap.

FUNDING SOURCE:

This budget transfer involves local dollars within Transportation's Road Machinery Fund.

BUDGET:

Requesting to move \$30,000 in to Road Machinery- Equipment from Road Machinery- Supplies (Auto/ Truck Replacement Parts) (\$15,000) and Road Machinery- Maintenance/ Repairs (\$15,000). Funds should be available to move in both Supplies- Auto/ Truck Replacement Parts and Maintenance/ Repairs since replacing a 32 year old vehicle with a new tire truck will reduce the amount of replacement and repairs parts needed and the amount of maintenance and repair work originally anticipated.
