PUBLIC SAFETY COMMITTEE MINUTES – JANUARY 20, 2026 CHARLES GARLAND, CHAIR

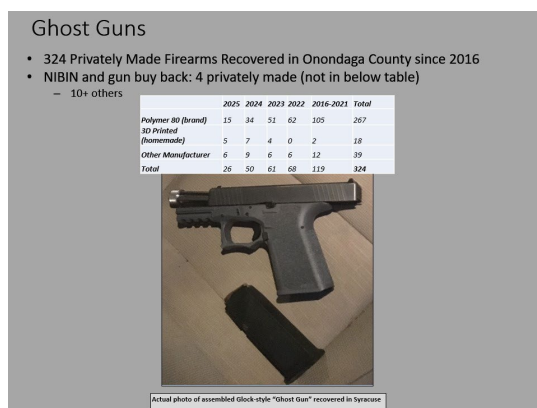
MEMBERS PRESENT: Ms. Block, Mr. Ryan, Mr. Knapp, Mr. McCarron, Mr. Garland

ALSO ATTENDING: Chairwoman Watts, Majority Leader Hernandez, Minority Leader May, Mr. Brown, Mr. Thompson, Mr. Romeo; also see attached list

Chair Garland called the meeting to order at 11:46 a.m., and asked the Deputy Clerk to take the roll. The previous meeting's minutes were approved.

1. ONONDAGA COUNTY OFFICE OF DISTRICT ATTORNEY:

- a. INFORMATIONAL – Presentation on GIVE (Joseph Coolican, First Chief Assistant District Attorney on behalf of William J. Fitzpatrick, District Attorney) (*Attachment No. 1–GIVE XII Monthly Meeting Report*)
- Introduces the GIVE program and begins presenting
 - Discussing current crime statistics, COBRA Curb strategy. Gun crime has dropped significantly. Explaining how addressing the problem is approached, POP. Diversionary courts. SNUG Program
 - Discussing where guns come from
 - Mr. Coolican talks about ghost guns



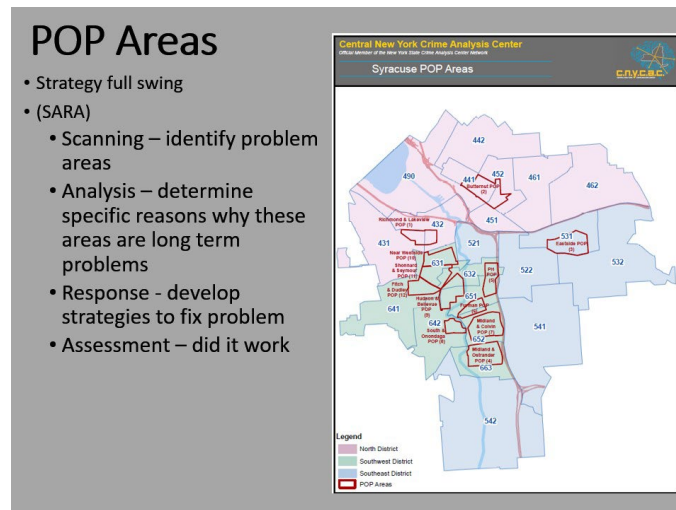
Questions/Comments from the Committee:

- Mr. Garland asks about the prevalence of 3D Printed Guns
 - Mr. Coolican answers that he has seen some but not a lot, and more common for people to modify guns
- Mr. Ryan asks what the decline in guns being recovered can be attributed to
 - Mr. Coolican answers that there's less crime across the board so less contact and opportunity for guns to be identified
- Mr. McCarron praises the DA's office work reducing gun violence

- Mr. Garland asks about repeat offenders
 - Mr. Coolican answered that those individuals are the ones being targeted. Also highlights most prosecution is now focused on “Evidence based” investigation which is based more on material evidence than witnesses.

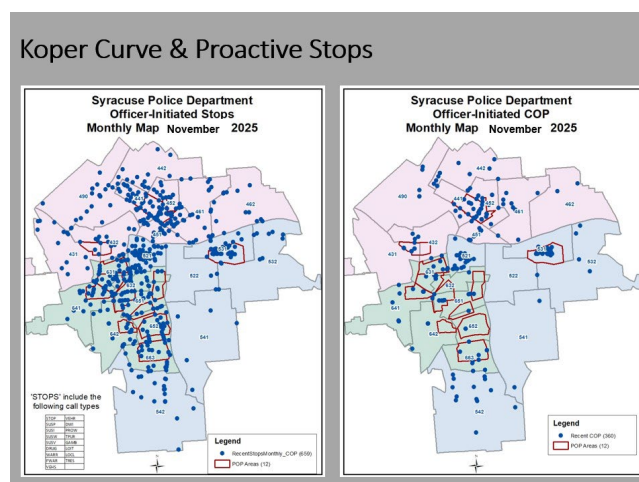
Presentation continued:

- Prosecutors are not just focused on sending people to prison, they care about keeping people out of prisons. There’s a wide variety of services that can be offered
- Speaks about non-fatal shooting investigations



Questions/Comments from the Committee:

- Mr. Garland asks about the geography of POP
 - Mr. Coolican answers that they always change and use new data to confirm
- Mr. Garland asks about the effectiveness of the cameras
 - Mr. Coolican explains that even a small number go along way. Gives praise to Onondaga County’s use of Evidence Based policing and points out nationally gun crime is declining.
- Speaks about KOPER Curve and Proactive Stopping and how effective that has been

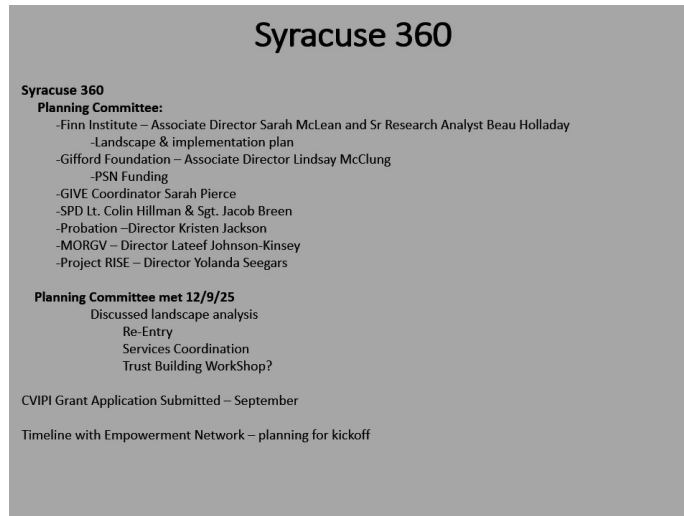


Questions/Comments from the Committee:

- Mr. McCarron asks about data specifics, asks about whether it includes CRT
 - Mr. Coolican says the data reflects all departments. Says CRT, Crime Reduction Team, has been dismantled.
- Mr. Garland asks how effective HOT addressing program is
 - Mr. McCarron answers not fantastic. Still very highly likely to re-offend

Presentation continued:

- Discussing procedural justice: education, neighborhood engagement, faith-based meetings
- Helping people with substance abuse issues get help
- Starting Syracuse 360 Outreach program



Questions/Comments from the Committee:

- Mr. Garland asks where the first *Syracuse 360* meeting will be
 - Mr. McCarron answers that it is still being figured out
- Mr. McCarron asks who takes lead, whether it's the mayor's office to reduce gun violence and about funding
 - Mr. Coolican says the city takes lead and fund but the DA is a partner.
- Mr. Garland asks about the Rescue Mission
 - Mr. Coolican says that the Rescue Mission has been a problem, because you're concentrating people with multiple compounding problems. Highlights 2020 bail reform as a problem because petty crime is not being prosecuted to the same extent. They are re-released
- Mr. Garland asks whether the reduction in crime is as a result of the change in how crime is prosecuted
 - Mr. Coolican "trends are trends", and says that we always try our best to address crime as it happens
- Mr. Garland asks whether they are good funding wise
 - Mr. Coolican answers in the affirmative and says that they are also starting a program called STRIVE. Want to specifically address domestic violence, similar to GIVE.
- Mr. Garland asks, what can the county legislature do to support
 - Mr. Coolican answers that they feel like they are in a good spot. Always available to speak more.
- Mr. McCarron asks about staffing
 - Mr. Coolican says they're almost running out of space in the office

- Mr. May: How has the changes in the budget helped with staffing, how is the work load, has management policy helped?
 - Mr. Coolican highlights how certain things are being offloaded from the DA's office, including traffic violations. Shares frustration that DA's are not incentivized to do after-hours work that is appreciated by courts and judges.
- Ms. Block asks about STRIVE and how it's being implemented
 - Mr. Coolican says they are in the process of working on it and that it's being made from scratch. Are forbidden to implement it until funding from grant provider is cleared at the start of the quarter
- Mr. McCarron asks whether there was a personnel resolution for STRIVE
 - Mr. Coolican answers in the affirmative
- Ms. Hernandez asks about the auto theft "Kia Boys"
 - Mr. Coolican answers that it has mostly cooled off and again highlights the problem with New York State law that prevents the prosecution of youth who commit crimes
- Ms. Hernandez asks about gun buyback program
 - Mr. Coolican answers that its sadly not effective at reducing violence
- Ms. Hernandez asks about resources the DA office provides families
 - Mr. Coolican answers yes, that the DA office has an entire office dedicated to assisting families including paying for funerals, providing suggestions for assistance

2. SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT:

- a. A Resolution Authorizing Certain Deputy Sheriffs of the Onondaga County Sheriff's Department to Participate in the Optional Twenty-year Retirement Plan Provided for Under Section 552 of the New York State Retirement and Social Security Law (Maureen Murphy, Chief Deputy Administration)
- Review of personnel files revealed that certain employees were not slotted in the current retirement plan
 - At no fault of their own

Questions / Comments from the Committee:

- Mr. May asks and clarifies that this motion will continue to be voted on for these individuals
 - Sheriff's Department states it is true

A motion was made by Mr. McCarron, seconded by Mr. Knapp, to approve this item. Passed unanimously; MOTION CARRIED.

3. DISCUSSION OF CORRESPONDING OUTSIDE BOARDS AND COMMISSIONS

- a. INFORMATIONAL – Onondaga County Boards and Commissions
 - Chairwoman Watts hands out document, Attachment No. 2 on the Minutes
 - Chairwoman Watts begins to speak about outside board and appointments. Explains how there are confirmations and appointments and that the goal is the process is that committees should make a decision about who they believe would be best suited for committees and boards. Resumes are being collected for new role, and encourage legislators to put forward people. Also, wants these boards to stay in touch. Send resumes to John DeSantis

Questions/Comments from the Committee:

- Mr. McCarron expresses willingness to continue to serve on the Jury Board
- Chair Garland expresses willingness to continue to serve on the Legislative Advisory Board

Chair Garland asks for a motion to adjourn

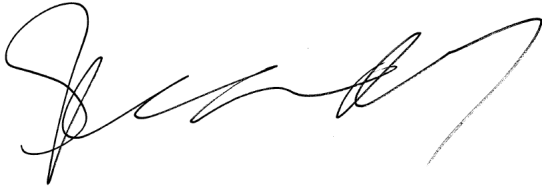

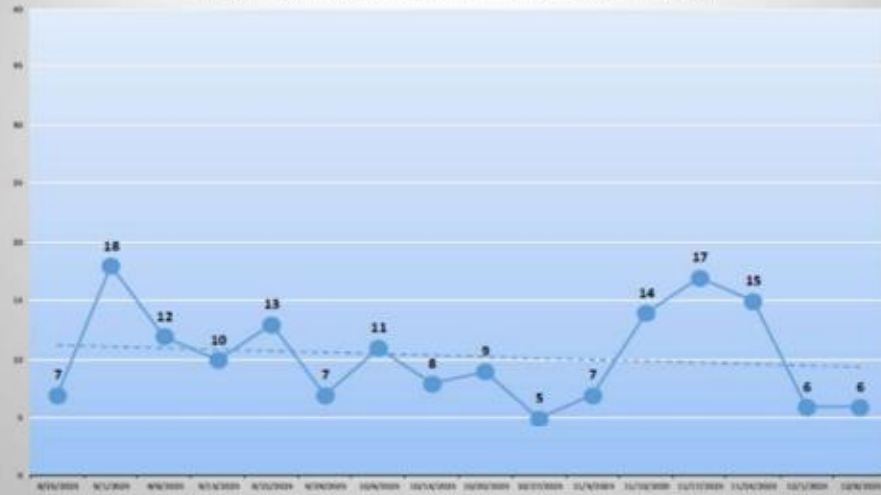

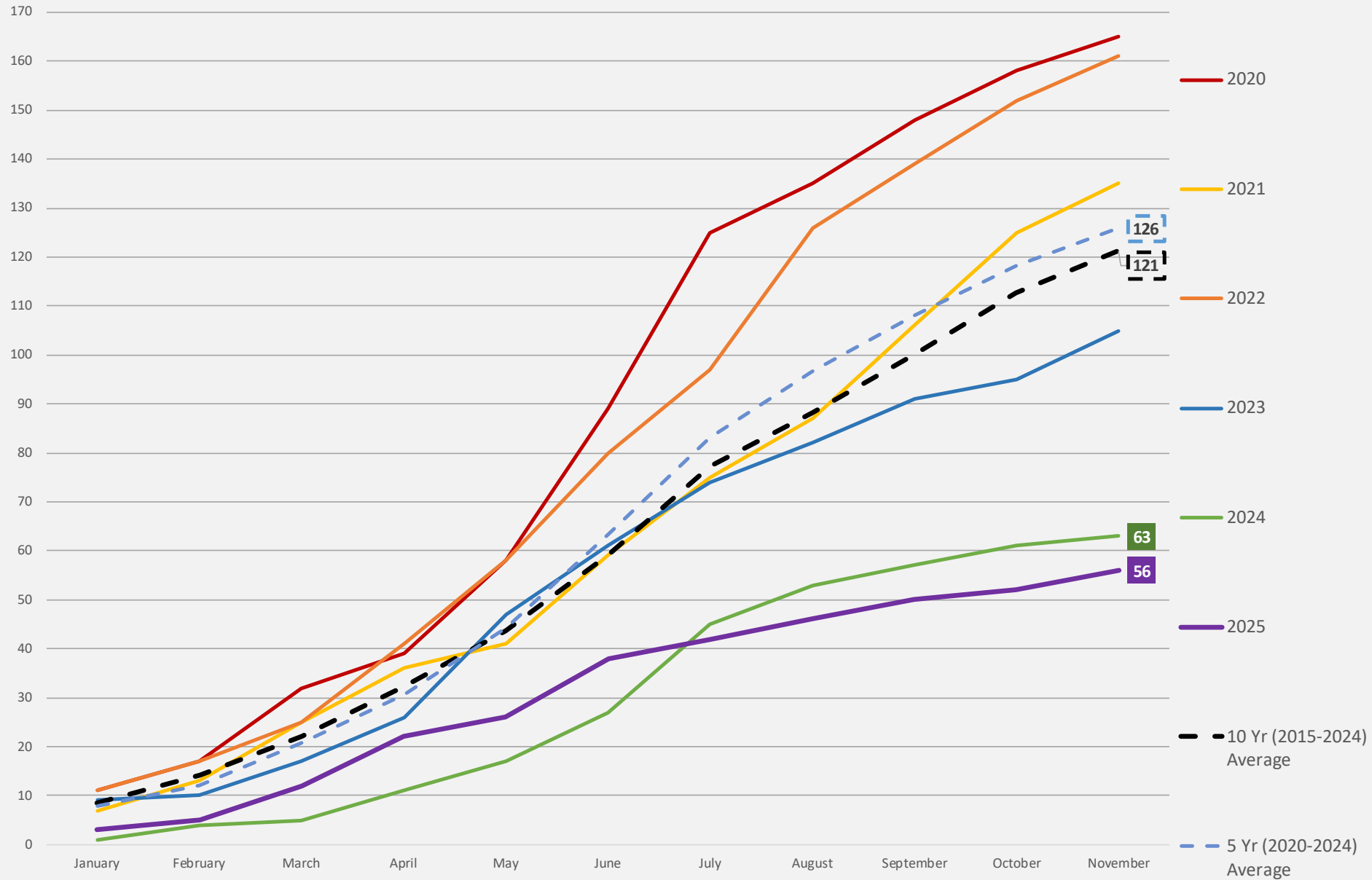

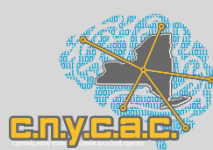

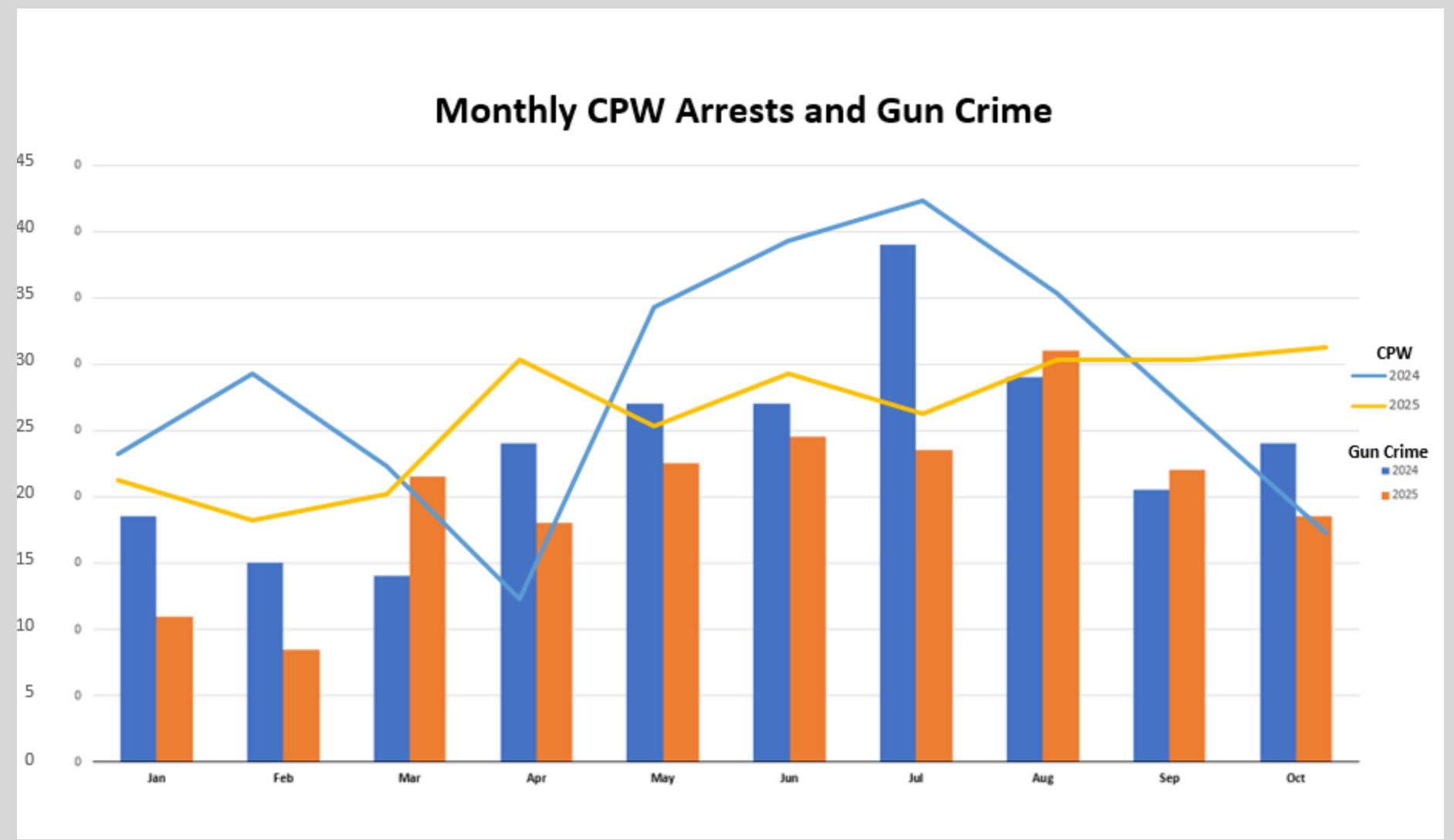

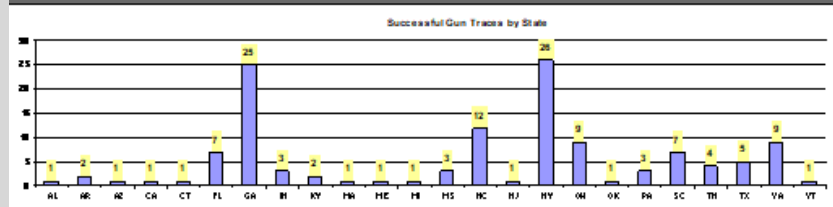

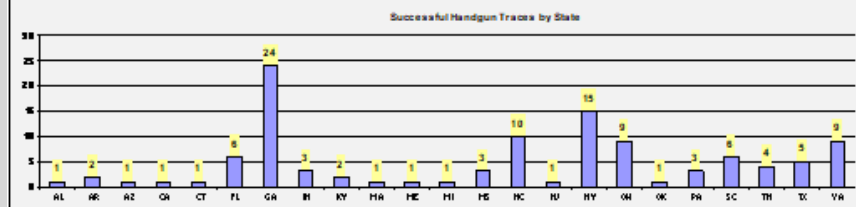

FIGURE 1: THE SARA MODEL OF PROBLEM-SOLVING



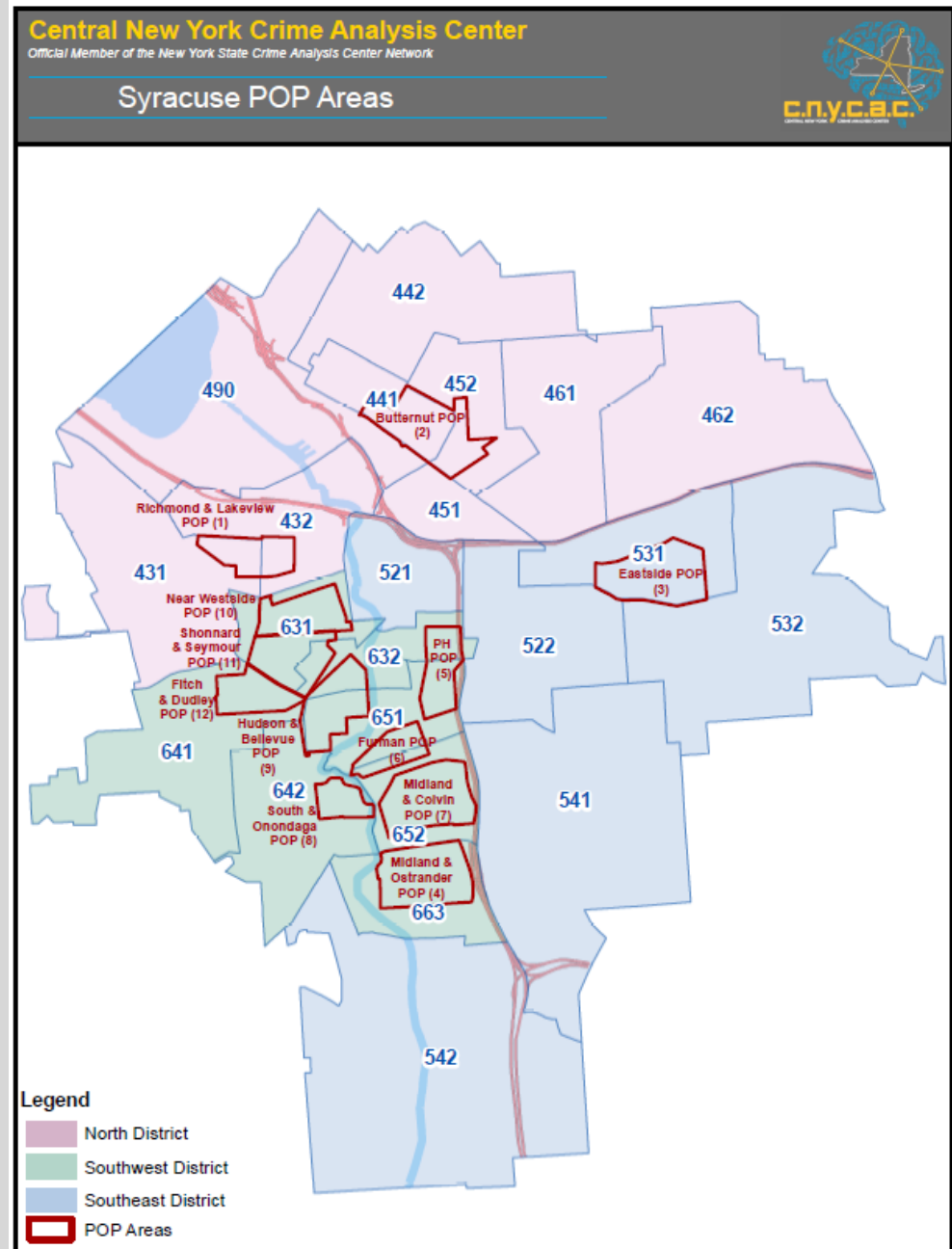

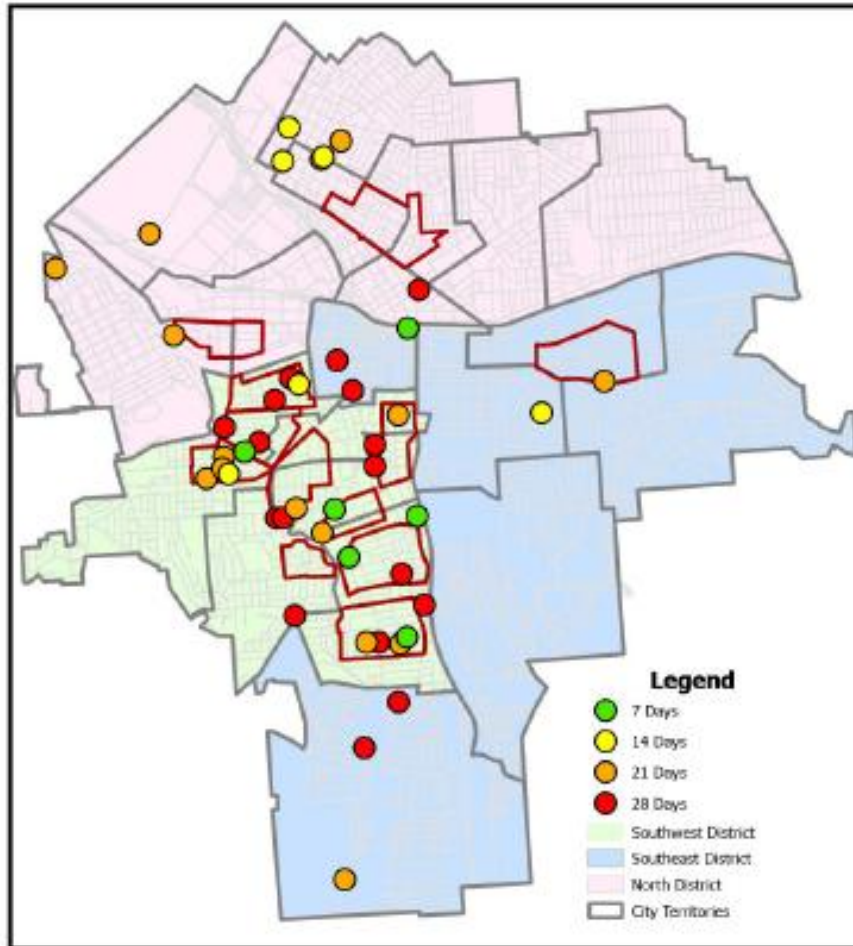


Hot Spots-Current Gun Violence

Gun Crime: 11/11/2025 - 12/09/2025



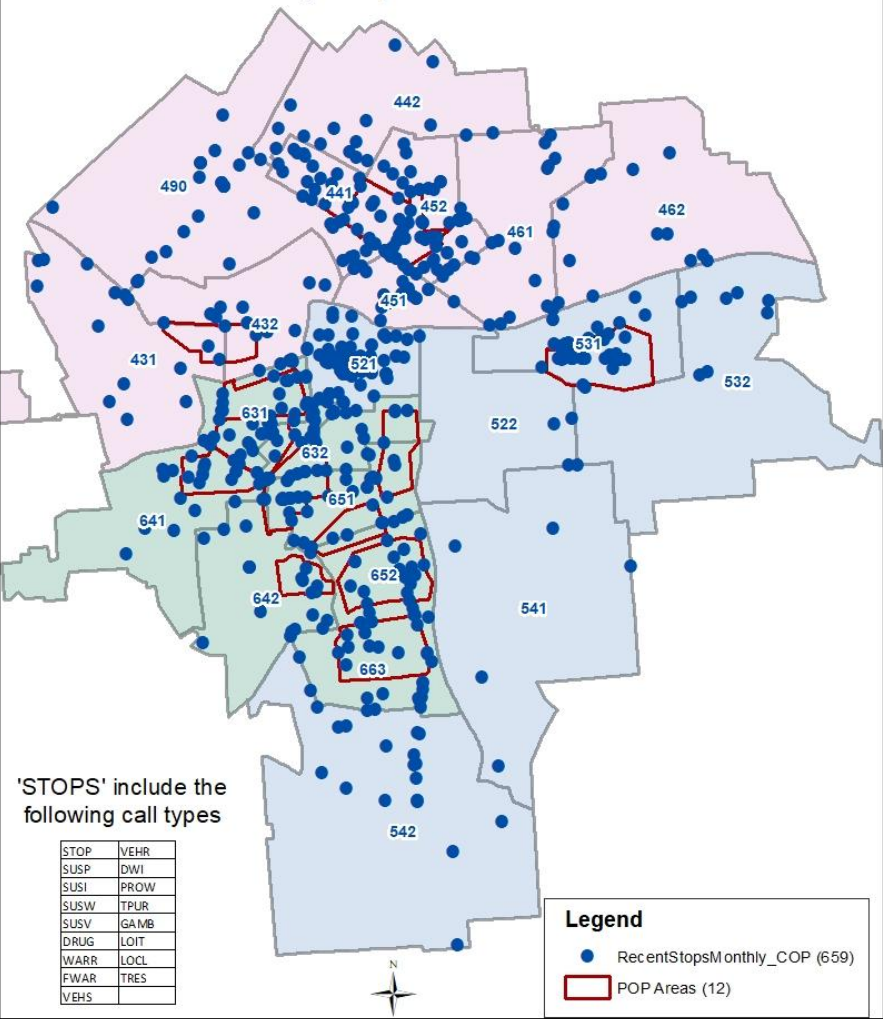

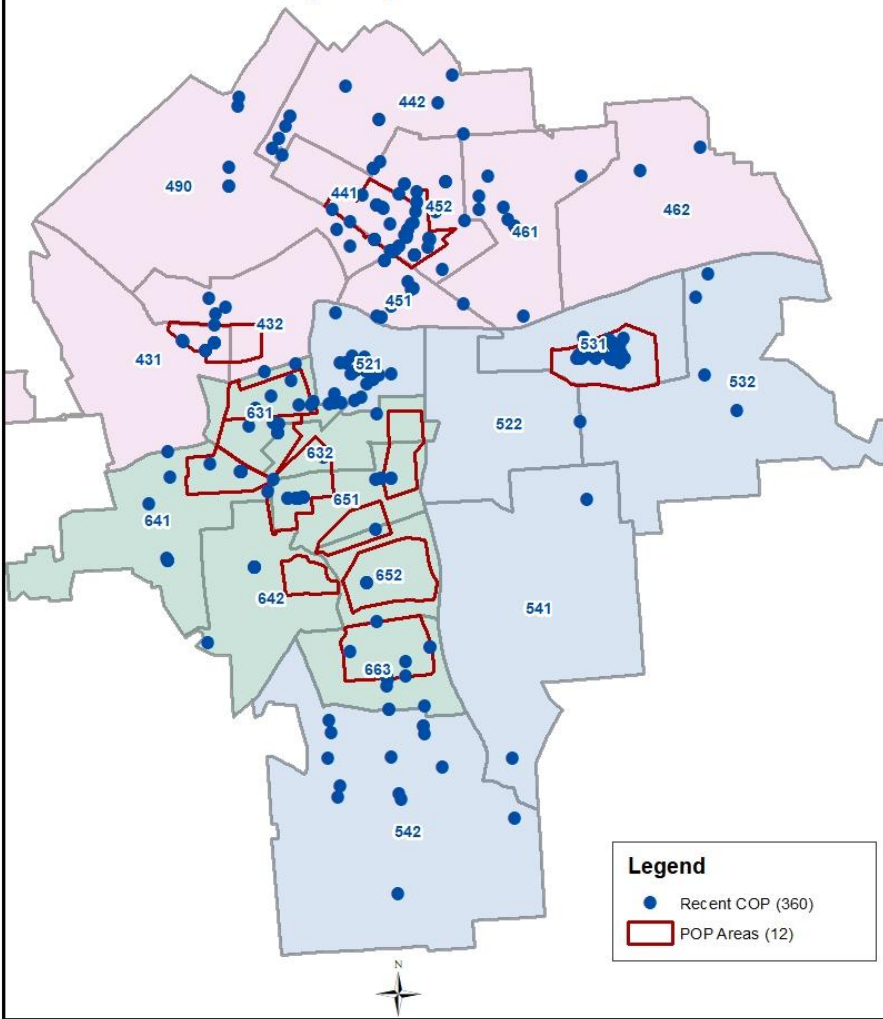


Koper Curve & Proactive Stops

Monthly Map November 2025

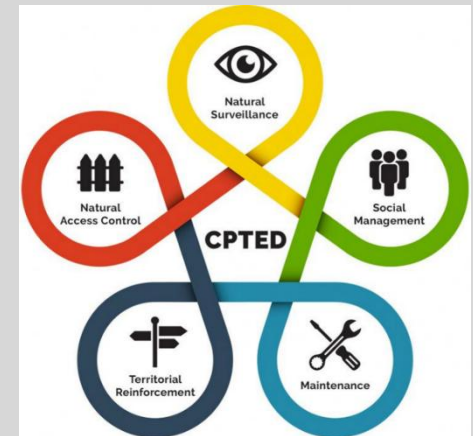

GIVE Top Offender Strategy - CORE Custom Notification Process

CORE Definitions and Criteria:

Chronic Offender Recognition Enforcement: list of approximately 30 individuals at the highest risk for perpetrating or being a victim of gun crime. Three years of arrest data and other intelligence is used to inform a point-system which weighs various factors determined to have an impact on gun crime and recidivism. The following criteria is measured:

- The number of arrests for gun crime (shots fired, shooting with injury, homicide by gun);
- The number of separate CPW-Firearm arrests (separate from a gun crime)
- The number of other violent crime arrests
- The number of times shot
- Gun-Intelligence (not arrested for CPW/gun crime, but have valid indications that the individual is involved or information indicating gun possession – One point only)
- Drug-Intelligence (valid indications through arrest or intelligence information – One point only)

Notes: CORE members must have recent police contact or intelligence. Those who qualify but are incarcerated for are removed. Intelligence factors indicating high-risk also allow for over-ride discretion.

Process:

- CNYCAC uses above criteria to create a list every 6 months (January and July)
- Letters Created, signed by Chief of SPD (Page 2)
- Letter Delivery
 - Team: MORGV (Lateef Johnson-Kinsey), GIVE Probation Officer, SPD Intelligence
 - Schedule: Letters delivered within first 2 weeks of CORE cycle for proper focused deterrence messaging
 - o Letters to Jail: SPD Intel Detective, MORGV
 - o First Attempt in the Community (all individuals): MORGV and Probation
 - o Second Attempt in the Community: MORGV, Probation, Police
 - Make sure everyone is trained and agrees on protocols
 - o All parties involved in cohesive message about service acquisition and deterrence
 - Focused Deterrence Messaging (References Pages 3-8)
 - o Identified as highest risk
 - o Consequences of engagement in gun violence will be severe
 - o Offer of priority services: outreach, mentorship, education, case management, job support etc
 - Case Management by MORGV
 - System to track letter delivery that can be shared with larger group: <https://forms.office.com/g/46ru0uFCbh>
 - MORGV internal system to track case management, referrals: <https://forms.office.com/g/ElzALTfMM7>
 - o Report aggregate data back to larger group
 - CNYCAC tracks arrests
 - ~~PerpStat~~ (LE Meeting, monthly) - discuss arrests, intelligence, prosecution updates and aggregate MORGV data

Assessment

- Incorporate data tracking for prosecution outcomes
- Create final aggregate report for assessment purposes (like what we would do for the GIVE application)
 - o Combine LE and MORGV information
 - o Ex: From 2023-2025 there were 80 people – # arrests, #probation, #jail, #received letters, #engaged/services

Your previous involvement in violent incidents has come to the attention of the Syracuse GIVE (Gun Involved Violence Elimination) partnership. Syracuse GIVE is a partnership of law enforcement, social services, and the community, whose goal is to reduce violence in our community. The GIVE law enforcement partners include local, state and federal law enforcement agencies such as the Syracuse Police Department, Onondaga County Sheriff's Office, New York State Police, Onondaga County Prosecutor's Office, Onondaga County Probation Department, New York State Parole, and federal law enforcement agencies including the FBI, DEA, ATF, U.S. Marshals and U.S. Attorney's Office. Based on your prior history, the GIVE partnership is concerned that you are at high risk of becoming a shooting victim or shooting someone else.

A recent review of your criminal history indicates should you become involved in any criminal offense involving weapons and/or violence, the consequences will be severe. As a convicted felon, you can be prosecuted in federal court if you possess a firearm or ammunition, which typically results in a **five-year federal sentence**. Depending on the circumstances, you may also be prosecuted as an armed career criminal, which carries a **fifteen year minimum federal sentence without hope of parole**. Furthermore, under New York State law you could face a **5-15 year mandatory prison sentence with 5 years of post-release supervision**.

Syracuse GIVE also provides you with an opportunity for services to assist you in a positive manner. We strongly encourage you to take advantage of these opportunities and services by calling Syracuse GIVE's ~~Onondaga County Probation Department~~ **115**. By simply making this call,

It is our hope that you will follow the laws of New York State. However, you have been forewarned, Mr. Anderson, that you have come onto our radar, and we are watching for any crimes that you may commit in the future with a new, particular interest. The people of our community – **your** community – want the violence to stop and agree that there is no excuse for it. Violence will not be tolerated.

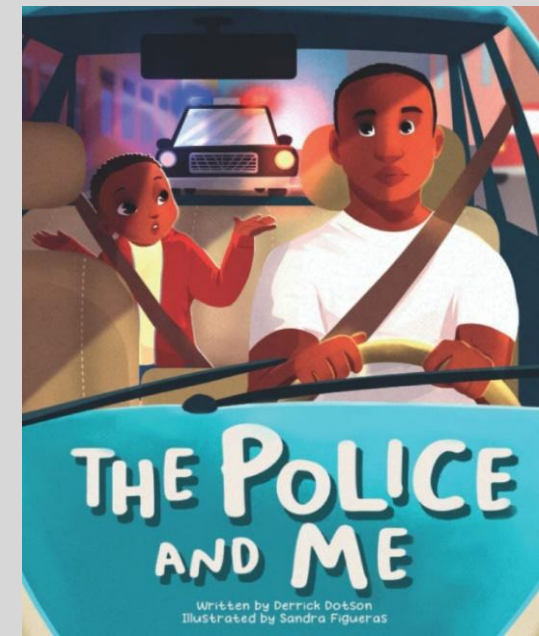

Onondaga County Justice Center Oversight Committee

Established by Local Law 4-2015, this Committee independently investigates and reviews complaints related to incidents at the Justice Center. The committee has nine (9) members who serve three-year terms, all subject to County Legislature approval, appointed as such:

- Six (6) recommended by the Chair of the County Legislature
 - Two (2) who shall have prior law enforcement experience
 - At least two (2+) who shall have experience in civil rights and/or civil liberties issues or advocacy.
 - At least one (1+) recommended by the Minority Leader of the County Legislature.
- Two (2) recommended by the County Executive
- One (1) recommended by the Mayor of Syracuse
